

# <u>Important information for DNA Donors</u> and their Families

We have been advised by The Fromelles Project Team (UWCSA), Australian Army, that DNA **donation and collections** will be carried out during the period February to December 2015.



We are advised that the reason for this change is that the "sunset clause" on all donor documents has now been reached, and thus all current "donor consent" forms are invalid. UWCSA advise that they will need to gain new consent documents from donors.

#### Comment from your management team:


This change will undoubtedly be felt by all members as many, many folk are waiting anxiously for their DNA samples to be taken, and many more members of families are waiting to see if a "match" can be made with a long lost loved one.

We have recently had a nominated and registered donor pass away, and that family was fortunate that another donor was available to 'fill in'. Given that this delay will place more folk at risk, we request your confidential advice should you wish, or wish a donor to be placed for a February/March collection. #### OUR FIRST ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

This was held at Parramatta RSL Club on 19 July, 2014. #### ANCESTRY.COM

We are hoping to progressively load information into Ancestry, in the hope that future investigations will be assisted in tracing of ancestors and descendants.

#### ACCESSING BIRTH, DEATH AND MARRIAGE REGISTRIES.

We have had some success in obtaining access to state registries in NSW, Victoria and South Australia for research purposes. If anyone is doing research on a soldier's family, and needs information (but not formal certificates – sorry) from one of these sources, please pass your request for access to Royce Atkinson at first instance. We will then have the information sourced so the research can proceed further.

#### SOME GENERAL COMMENTS REGARDING DNA AND IDENTIFYING EXHUMED BODIES.

Many people have given samples of their saliva for DNA matching, and hopefully a successful identification of a recovered soldier. Frustratingly, once the donation has been made, many people don't have any further contact from Army, and others are contacted in what seems like an 'out of the blue' experience. To make the process more understandable, we have put together the following information for possible clarification for all involved:-

Our Association is made up of folk, who have an interest in, or have a relative who fought at the Battle of Fromelles. Many members of our Association voluntarily undertake research to identify living relatives of soldiers who **may** be buried at the Pheasant Wood Military Cemetery (PWMC) – Fromelles.

All 250 soldiers exhumed from a mass grave have provided viable DNA and can only be identified by seeking DNA donors from family members. Two types of DNA are required, one is mitochondrial (Mt) - passed on by mothers, but also held by sons, and the other - Y strain - passed on by fathers to sons (it's more complex - but that's a "rough" outline). As at March 2014, 144 of the 250 have been identified via DNA matching.

#### SOME GENERAL COMMENTS REGARDING DNA ... Continued

#### Material collected by Researchers

Most of the documentation collected is freely available from genealogical sites, and forms the basis of our outcomes. We do use these sites to store material, and maintain records, though it should be noted that living people are not identified. This material is available to donors and family spokespersons. No material will be released to others, unless with the agreement of the donor/spokesperson.

Once the family pedigree is drafted, it is sent to the potential donor for verification, and/or is peer reviewed by another researcher. Once a "confirmation of accuracy" is received, it is sent to the Unrecovered War Casualties Section - Australian Army (Fromelles Project Team) together with all relevant information.

At that point of time, **the Association's involvement and knowledge of DNA collection and testing ceases**, because the matter comes under Australian Federal Privacy Legislation.

### **Australian Army Procedures**

Within Australia, the Army staff will discuss and verify the information with the donor (generally via phone) and arrange the DNA donation process.

Outside Australia, the Army has requested the Association gains the donor's written agreement to donate DNA.

The Army's timing of the DNA collection is usually done in one block/time frame and is not known to the Association. Please bear in mind that:

- ♦ ONLY if a match is made, will donor/s be informed, by the Army, in March/April each year. However we are aware that successful identifications have been made up to 4 years after the submission of DNA. Thus we are reluctant to notify folk of a "result" when a) the process may take some time, and b) the process is totally under the management of the Australian Army.
- ♦ Federal Privacy Legislation (a): Please note that the Australian Army does not communicate with the Association regarding a donor, or the status of the DNA process, once we have made a submission. Thus, the only way we may be aware of the status of the DNA process − will be if you contact us.
- Federal Privacy Legislation (b): Please note that you may be donating in 2014, 2015 and beyond. Some donors made donations of DNA in 2010. It is vital to acknowledge that the value of your DNA is (at the least) equal to any earlier donation. It is suggested that DNA donors ask the Army for contact details of other donors and family members as this may bring families together. If a successful identification is made, then either both donors, or an elected family spokesperson, must agree on a set of words for the headstone.
- ♦ The Australian Army only releases the names of those soldiers identified once per year. In 2014, the announcement was to coincide with Anzac Day but for reasons unknown, was deferred. The Association receives no "early notification", and we too, await the formal announcement.

#### Donation and management of DNA.

The actual donor process only requires 2 "scrapings" to be taken from the inside of the mouth by a swab ("cotton bud"), the swabs are then inserted into sterile tubes and sent by mail to the laboratory. Instructions come with the DNA kit.

Your DNA record is kept in a secure facility and access to any data is restricted to the actual geneticist and approved Australian Army staff.

Australian Army policy does not allow any person or entity (other than those identified above) to access DNA data. This includes the actual donor.

There are no costs associated with our research - or with the DNA donor process.

DNA – via a Google search (remember; Y DNA – only passed from father to son; Mt DNA only passed on by daughters, but is also present in sons.)

Should you have any questions what so ever, please contact (Royce Atkinson), or a member of the Association Research Team, and we shall attempt to provide you with any required information.

As an update to this information, we have been hoping that Army will be issuing DNA kits to interested donors, by Christmas 2014 but at present, we are still waiting for confirmation that all interested donors have been issued with their kits.



#### **IDENTIFICATIONS**

We were delighted to be part of 20 identifications of soldiers announced earlier this year. Clearly there are a lot of active researchers looking for family connections and chasing down leads. As at  $6^{th}$  October, 2014 we had submitted our  $35^{th}$  soldier submission to Unrecovered War Casualties Section – Army (UWCSA) for the current year.

While this is an outstanding effort, we do still need as many helpers as is possible, so if you can spare an hour or two occasionally, please let us know....

While we always hope to be able to identify a recovered soldier's remains, many, many bodies lied unrecovered in No Mans Land. Many were also buried in the mass grave at VC Corner Cemetery.

# OPENING OF THE NEW BATTLE OF FROMELLES MUSEUM IN JULY, 2014.

Commentary from Paul Cobb, author Fromelles 1916




Twenty five years ago when I first became involved with locals at Fromelles in activities such as battlefield archaeology, researching the battle and creation of the museum in the Town Hall the village was still little known and, to an extent, off the beaten track for most visitors to the Western Front. Now it is firmly on the tour circuits thanks to the opening of a new museum adjacent to the recently established Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) cemetery.



- Over the weekend 18/19th July 2014 there were various events arranged including commemoration of a further twenty newly identified soldiers, all casualties of the Attack at Fromelles 98 years ago.
- On Friday, 18th July guests gathered by the museum to hear speeches from Senator Michael Ronaldson, Minister for Veteran Affairs, Australia, His Excellency Ric Wells, Australian Ambassador to France, Jean-Gabriel Masson, Mayor of Fromelles, Martial Delebarre, President of the Communaute

de Communes de Weppes and, for many years a key player in recording the events of July 1916 plus various other representatives from the regional councils who contributed to the 600,000 euro project. Once these were completed (on a *very* hot day!) guests were given a guided tour of the new museum.







Recognising the modern trend for the use of technology and fewer exhibits would the new museum be a worthy successor to the one it has replaced and would it provide visitors with an adequate overview of the July 1916 action? In short, the answer to both question is 'ves'.



On entering the museum there is a small café which would be a handy rest area for weary battlefield visitors, a shop, toilets and then the exhibition area. Several battlefield scenes have been created including a Bavarian

area. Several battlefield scenes have been created including a Bavarian communications post and a Royal Engineer at work in a dugout. The story of several soldiers is given along with a display of photos of a further selection including a Victorian Naval Reservist who was one of a group that served as infantry becoming part of 30<sup>th</sup> Btn. Various artefacts are displayed and there are audio-visual presentations running. In another part of the museum are mannequins with uniforms of the main combatants and a table with imaginative projected moving images of the battle with units shown and the phases explained.

#### Opening of Fromelles Museum ... Cont.

- There are a few minor errors that, I understand, will be corrected; for example a soldiers "identity disk". Rectifying them is to be commended and other locations on the Western Front would do well to ensure that translations are validated before displays are produced.
- On Saturday morning there were a couple of short commemorations, firstly, at the Australian Memorial Park and then at VC Corner Australian Cemetery and Memorial. Both were attended by the Australian Ambassador to France, the Minister for Veteran Affairs, local dignitaries, guests and a strong contingent from the Australian Defence Force plus the Shrine Guard from the Shrine of Remembrance in Melbourne.
- ◆ Later that day the headstone dedication service was held in Fromelles (Pheasant Wood) Military Cemetery in the presence of the same representatives as at the museum opening plus many families related to newly identified casualties. Twenty soldiers were commemorated in a short but dignified service and it is thought that these may be the last group to be identified. Now, 144 soldiers have headstones bearing their details in place of one recording an unknown soldier.
- This is a remarkable achievement by those involved in the project since the mass grave was identified.
- ♦ The new museum is a worthy addition to battlefield visit itineraries. It is open on Monday, Wednesday-Friday from 10.30 to 17.30 and on Saturday, Sunday and public holidays from 13.30 to 17.30. Entry fees are 6.50 euros for adults, concessions cost 4 euro and group and school party rates are available. Contact can also be made via contact@musee-bataille-fromelles.fr or +33(0)3 59611514.
