

* THE FROMELLES IDENTIFICATIONS FOR 2019 *

SEVEN FIRST WORLD WAR AUSTRALIAN ARMY SOLDIERS NO LONG-ER LIE IN UNKNOWN GRAVES. Australian Army March 26 at 12:18 PM ·

Over 100 years after their loss in the Battle of Fromelles, these men now have their names on their headstones, after they were unveiled at the Commemoration and Headstone Rededication Ceremony, with the support of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

Having been recovered from an unmarked mass grave in 2009, with 250 of their mates, the following 7 soldiers were formally identified earlier this month:

- 352 Private Arthur George BATT 32nd Bn. A.I.F. age 32 of Hilton, South Australia
- ♦ 4188 Private Edward James HOPE 54th Bn. A.I.F. age 28 of Penrith, New South Wales
- ♦ 641 Private Leslie Clark DUNN 31st Bn. A.I.F. age 28 of West Melbourne, Victoria
- ♦ 1291 Private George HONEY 32nd Bn. A.I.F. age 31 of West Guilford, Western Australia
- ♦ 715 Lance Corporal Ralph JOHNSON 31st Bn. A.I.F. age 19 of Middle Brighton, Victoria
- ♦ 77 Lance Corporal John Alexander CRAWFORD 32nd Bn. A.I.F. age 32 of Hindmarsh, South Australia
- 3433 Private Peter Paul SHANNON 53rd Bn. A.I.F. age 35 of Merriwa, New South Wales

This result is only possible because family members were identified and donated their DNA for identification purposes. We still seeks DNA from relatives of the missing from Fromelles. Hopefully more will come this year. This makes the total identified now 166 out of 250.

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2/3 OF THE DIGGERS FROM PHEASANT WOOD NOW HAVE THEIR OWN

HEADSTONES From Jim Munro, President FFFAIF

The names of 233 or 93% of the 250 soldiers buried by the German Reserve Bavarian Infantry Regiment soldiers following the Battle of Fromelles are known.

The graves of 166 or 66% of the 250 soldiers whose remains were recovered from the communal pits near Pheasant Wood, Fromelles in French Flanders and were reburied with full military honours in the new Fromelles (Pheasant Wood) Military Cemetery in 2010 are now identified with their names.

The names of a further 67 soldiers are known to be buried in the Cemetery along with 17 whose identity is not known. Identifying these 84 soldiers remains the challenge that can only be solved now by matching the soldier's DNA with that of a descendant. These are some of the 1,102 Australian soldiers killed in the Battle of Fromelles on the night of 19th July, 1916 and continuing into the 20th with no known grave. (1,333 Australian soldiers were listed as having no known grave less 231 now known to have been buried near Pheasant Wood). The 2019 Fromelles Identification Board has revealed the names of 7 more Australian soldiers who will have their names inscribed on individual headstones. Again, they are:

- ♦ 715 Lance Corporal Ralph JOHNSON 31st Bn. A.I.F. age 19 of Middle Brighton, Victoria
- ♦ 3433 Private Peter Paul SHANNON 53rd Bn. A.I.F. age 35 of Merriwa, New South Wales.

The identification of these soldiers follows at least 100 submissions made to the Joint Identifications Board for consideration in March, 2019, mostly by the Fromelles Association of Australia supported by DNA samples from descendants. (See Seeking Fromelles DNA matches.)

Privates Batt, Dunn, Honey, Hope and Shannon's names were on the original Working List developed for the Fromelles Project in 2008 based on the research and advocacy of Lambis Englezos OAM and his team. The Service Records of these soldier contained German documentation advising that their bodies had been buried by the German Army following the Battle. The name of Lance Corporal Ralph JOHNSON was added to the list following research by the Fromelles Descendants Database team who complied detailed family histories for most of the soldiers on the Working List. The Australian Army Fromelles Project Group subsequently called for descendants to register for DNA contributions and this more recently has been continued by the Unrecovered Casualties – Army unit and broadened to relatives of any soldier killed in the Battle of Fromelles with no known grave. This has enabled Lance Corporal Crawford also to be identified from DNA samples contributed by relatives.

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In response to Jim Munro and FFFAIF's thoughtful article, we wrote:

Hello Jim,

Thank you for the comments in your email, and for passing on the attached items.

It is said that there is no glory in war. But there is heartfelt appreciation for the families of the fallen at Fromelles, when they discover a tangible connection with the Battle of Fromelles. Relatives can visit for the first time ever and see a headstone with a family member's name on it, with an epitaph that will be forever.

Tears and tingling sensations often come together when this happens. Last year I saw the family of Captain Mortimer on their knees with such mixed feelings, in front of his headstone. I watched the families of Gardner walk proudly with tears in their eyes, seeping down onto their cheeks, and not wiping the tears away. I read the letters and postcards of Bell at his headstone, on behalf of his family.

I think this is what drives us. I think that the heroes in this process are our researchers, who trace the families, track the donors, contact the families, and ask for their help. And in the process, make ongoing friends. And without any expectation of glorification, or reward.


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RESULTS OF OUR POLL: SHOULD EVERY SOLDIER KILLED IN ACTION AT FROMELLES, BE EXHUMED FOR IDENTIFICATION?

Our poll was cast through Facebook, our website, and direct e-mails to people we have contact information for. It read:

At the end of World War 1, there were 1,299 unidentified Diggers laying in unmarked graves, buried under the soil of No Man's Land, or exposed to the elements, at Fromelles, a world away from home. They had no identification, and no headstone; while the living had no place of pilgrimage, no place to grieve and certainly no personal recognition of their loved one.

Our soldiers were not well treated, having been left to lay rotting in 'No Man's Land' for 3 years



before being placed in mass graves. Did you know that the US Army in WW1 identified 97% of their fallen; the British were satisfied with 20 to 25%. With today's technology this is now intolerable.

Despite initial opposition from the Australian Government, 250 Australian soldiers were carefully exhumed from the mass graves of Pheasant Wood, and finally, laid to rest in peace in the Fromelles (Pheasant Wood) Military Cemetery after making the greatest sacrifice during battle. Of those, 159 (more than 60%) have been positively identified, given a name, and given a place in our nation's history. But that was only 250 of the original 1299 unidentified at the end of WW1

The enduring love, respect and ongoing commitment of families means that between 2000 and 3000 donors have freely given their DNA in an attempt to identify lost soldiers.

Their details and DNA samples have been supplied to the Army, and are now on record. It is anticipated that many more from Pheasant Wood will be identified because of this selfless act of the living out of respect for the dead.

We support its use to identify all of our boys who were sacrificed in that bloody madness called the Battle of Fromelles.

Right now we are specifically thinking of the many families, who have no identification, no headstone, no place of pilgrimage, no place to grieve, and certainly no personal recognition of their loved one.

We believe that all our fallen deserve to be identified, their service to country honoured; and to be reconnected with their families, even in death.

We believe that the only way to recognise Australia's debt to these gallant soldiers is to have them exhumed, their DNA taken and to be matched against the existing and any future data base. This will ensure that in time, they are properly honoured and memorialised.

We asked: Do you support the exhumation all these soldiers in the hope they can be identified? YES / NO?

The results are now able to be published, and the final tally can now be shared with you all.

There were 3954 'reaches' on Facebook, with 994 'engagements', resulting in 415 votes posted.

There were over 600 direct emails to persons interested in Fromelles, and who are on our contact list.

We have begun to and will continue to use this result in order to pursue appropriate treatment of the missing at Fromelles.

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CLINGAN AND GROGAN: A DISCOVERY AT FROMELLES

A story by John and Dorothy.

In 2013, my wife Dorothy and I visited Fromelles as part of our honeymoon.

My wife had organised the visit as we wished to pay our respects to my identified relative- Pvt Alexander Clingan.

We met the wonderful people of the town, paid our respects at Alec's grave, walked the battle-

field then journeyed to 'VC Corner' where the names of all those killed in action are engraved..

We found Alexander's name and I took a moment alone to reflect. Dorothy walked across and stopped at a randomly selected panel just a couple down from me.

At her first glance at the names she made an incredible discovery. Her eyes went straight to the name of her great uncle- Sergent Vincent Grogan, killed in action, 19th July 1916.

Vincent was from Barnsdale in Victoria. Alexander, from Waterloo NSW.

We had no idea until that moment, that both of our families shared a common link to that terrible day. We confirmed Vincent's details upon our return home. His name appears in a German death list.



ADOPT A COBBER AT FROMELLES.

For the previous two years, Pierre Seillier has worked with the pupils and the School Principal of the Cobbers School at Fromelles, on the topic of Australian remembrance. He has conducted several presentations at the school about Fromelles before, during and after WW1, the life of soldiers in trenches on the frontline, and the stories of some Australian soldiers buried in Pheasant Wood Military Cemetery. Following the project of the School Principal and himself—"Adopt a Cobber of Fromelles" - the kids decided to adopt the graves of some soldiers identified since 2009. They are in touch with descendants and share their work with them. Pupils of the school are the next generation of remembrance, the next generation of French-Australian friendship, the next keepers of the flame. With the identification of seven new soldiers, Pierre and the School Principal hope to meet more families, to adopt other cobbers.
